PEACE IN THE MIDST OF ANXIETY

Many of you have heard of Saint Francis of Assisi's famous prayer:

Lord, make me an instrument of Thy peace; Where there is hatred, let me sow love; Where there is injury, pardon; Where there is error, the truth: Where there is doubt, the faith; Where there is despair, hope; Where there is darkness, light; And where there is sadness, joy. O Divine Master. Grant that I may not so much seek To be consoled, as to console; To be understood, as to understand; To be loved as to love. For it is in aiving that we receive: It is in pardoning that we are pardoned; And it is in dying that we are born to eternal life. Amen.

Francis was a part of a youth movement in Assisi that was reading the Gospels, and this community wanted their lives to reflect every aspect of the Gospel of Jesus. In his book, "Red Letter Revolution," Shane Claiborne wrote of the saints in this community, "Part of what was exciting about that movement was that they didn't hate the church. They actually loved the church, and they loved it enough to try to change the things that were wrong."

This resonated with me because in the last month, I have watched the church and the denomination that I love, Mayfield and the United Methodist Church, go through difficult changes, that have produced both grief and hope for the future. At Mayfield Church we have had Rev. Jan Fillmore retire, and at the same time we move to welcome Pastor Jill Scott. And, the United Methodist Church has seen churches disaffiliate and leave the connection. YET, this prayer from Saint Francis reminded me what I want to be about, what I believe Mayfield Church's mission is about, AND most importantly, what the Gospel of Jesus Christ is about.

INTRODUCING OUR NEW ASSOCIATE PASTOR

I am blessed to be a daughter, a wife, a mother, and a pastor among many other things. I am the oldest of six children of Jack and Helen Raymond. My parents still live in Findlay, Ohio, where I graduated from High School. I have four sisters and one brother who live in Cincinnati, OH; Orlando, FL; Murrell's Inlet, SC;



Findlay, OH; and Pittsburgh, PA. I have three daughters. Anneliese Spangler, the oldest, is a medical coder who lives in Akron. Helenayn is 20 and just graduated from West Geauga High School. Dakota is 17 and will be a senior at West G next fall. My lovely husband of 21 years, David, is a retired police officer who now busies himself as a fantastically talented househusband and handyman. We have two Yorkie mixes named Muffin and Mocha and two cats named Moses and Ollie. Our family has lived in Chesterland for over 20 years.

I attended Bowling Green State University as an undergraduate and earned a Bachelor's Degree in Vocal Performance Studies. I also earned a Master of Education degree in elementary education at The Ohio State University. Last May, I graduated from United Theological Seminary with a Master of Divinity degree. How does one go from music performance studies to elementary education to theological studies? Perhaps that tale is too long for this venue. But let it suffice to say that the road has been long and winding. One might even say that God has a funny way of leading us where he wants us to go whether we are aware of it or not.

Growing up, my parents did not encourage us toward Christianity, although I can honestly say I was always a believer. I remember Jesus, whom I called "the man in the white nightgown," would come to play with me when I was very small. My parents called him my "imaginary friend," but I knew he was real. When I was fifteen, friends from school invited me to the midnight Christmas Eve Service at St. Andrew's UMC. My parents let me go. So, I walked the mile up to the church in the freezing cold. I got there just before the service was supposed to start. One of my friends met me at the door and instead of letting me go find a seat in the sanctuary, he dragged me down to the choir room to "meet his choir director." When I walked through the door, I was ambushed. Someone took my coat, someone put a choir robe on me, and someone placed a choir folder in my hand. Before I knew what was happening, I was on my way up to the choir loft. For the first time, that night, I sang sacred music in a worship service. It was the most moving thing I had ever done, and I was hooked. From then on, I joined every musical group the church had to offer and rarely missed a Sunday for the rest of high school. At nineteen years old, I was baptized and joined the church.

Flash forward about twenty-five years. I started attending Mayfield Church when it moved out to Chesterland. David joined me soon after, and our two youngest daughters were baptized here. Of course, it was the music that grabbed me and kept me coming back. But something happened during my time at Mayfield. God began speaking to me not only through the music but through everything I was doing in every aspect of my life. Eventually, God's call on my life became so strong that I could no longer deny it. In 2013, I entered seminary and the following year I became a licensed local pastor.

I have served three churches prior to coming to Mayfield. I was an associate pastor of Middlefield UMC, pastor of Shoregate UMC in Willowick, and pastor of Portage Faith UMC in Mantua. All of these appointments have formed me, taught me, loved me, and brought me ever closer to our Lord, Jesus Christ. I hope to interview this fall for commissioning as a Provisional Elder in the United Methodist Church. I cannot wait to continue my journey together with you!

"HANDS THAT SERVE" TRIALS FOR HOPE

Trials For Hope is a community outreach program located in Lakewood, OH and serves the greater Cleveland area. It provides food, personal care items and clothing to the homeless, seniors, shut-ins, youth, veterans and families in crisis. It provides at least 175 bags of food, 800 personal care bags and over 1,000 pounds of vegetables and meat per month. Trials for



Hope was started in 2010 when the founder, Jon, was asked to dispose of some travel size toiletries for an organization where he volunteered had to close its doors. He took those toiletries to a local community meal to pass out and discovered the need for these items and how appreciative people were to receive them. Now, Trials for Hope helps over 2,100 people per year and with a hope to continue to grow and offer more assistance in our community.

EAST OHIO ANNUAL CONFERENCE DISAFFILIATE REPORTS

As many of you heard during our East Ohio Annual Conference report from our delegates, 237 churches chose to disaffiliate from our conference over the past year. Although there was no vote required from any church at this time, many of these churches took action to vote earlier this year to leave the denomination, and the approval vote at Annual Conference was the final step in the process.


Earlier this week, I read an article from my friend and colleague in ministry at Church of the Savior in Cleveland Heights, Rev. Andy Call, who is also a delegate for General Conference. His article read:

The churches that left did so over questions of human sexuality. Though the United Methodist Church still has restrictions in place over same-sex marriage and ordination of people who identify as LGBTQ+, momentum is building to change those restrictions, at least within the United States and Europe.

The disaffiliation process was designed by conservative leaders as part of what was named 'The Traditional Plan' adopted at the 2019 General Conference, envisioned to create a path for Progressive churches to leave the denomination. A significant momentum shift following that conference and waning support for a closed-door negotiated separation agreement led a conservative splinter group to form a new denomination (Global Methodist Church) and to urge conservative-leaning congregations to use that provision to exit the United Methodist Church. That provision, ¶2553, outlined a process of a straw vote, informational meetings, a 2/3 vote of the church conference, and payment of two years of apportionments (fair share of conference budget based on percentage of local church spending).

Prior to disaffiliation, there were 651 churches in the East Ohio Conference. 237 of those churches chose to leave the denomination, 36.4% of the churches in the conference. 144 of those churches reported fewer than 25 in average worship attendance. Most (not all) were in rural, less population-dense areas. Their giving represents 26% of the conference budget. ... (13 of the disaffiliating churches were in the Western Reserve District, with the closest 36 minutes away in Thompson from Mayfield Church.)

Across the denomination, the impact is less pronounced than in our own conference. The graphic below reflects data current as of May 31. The total number of disaffiliations is now approximately 5,300, but the graphic still represents a fairly accurate picture of the impact on the denomination worldwide.



The departures from the UMC will not have a measurable, direct impact on [the local church]. We remain part of the United Methodist Church and will maintain our connections to the denomination and our mission partners around the world. The greatest impacts will be at the conference and general conference levels. Agencies and budgets are being adjusted to meet the change. While those will be difficult decisions, they are not expected to create a disruption in vital mission and ministry.

As the conversation of disaffiliation was brought to Mayfield Church's leadership multiple times last year, we researched, discussed, and decided that this conversation has continued to be divisive, and while it was important, staying unified in our mission was more important.

Our mission is to offer Christ to every person who walks through our doors and to share the pathway to Christ with them. Even when there are matters on which we disagree, at Mayfield Church we have always been committed to being a community of faith that uses both our hearts and our heads. We have been an inclusive community, radical in the center, and even where we find ourselves on different sides of opinions and arguments, we can still have difficult conversations and stay committed to the mission of offering Christ, worshipping God, caring for people, equipping disciples of Jesus Christ, and working to transform the world.

It was with deep sadness that we lost our connection with these congregations. We pray for them and pray for God to heal the pain and harm that has been caused by this division within the body of Christ. Jesus' prayer was, "I pray that they will all be one, just as you and I are one—as you are in me, Father, and I am in you. And may they be in us so that the world will believe you sent me. I have given them the glory you gave me, so they may be one as we are one. I am in them and you are in me. May they experience such perfect unity that the world will know that you sent me and that you love them as much as you love me." (John 17:21-23 NLT)

May we move forward with hearts of love for Christ and love for one another.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE ANNOUNCEMENT

In the June 18 worship services, our delegates to the East Ohio Annual Conference presented their reports to the congregation. Ted Diadiun and Denny Nelson were our church delegates. Phil David, Cindy Myers, and Linnea Bubnow went as at-large district delegates. And, Sarah Dixon attended as a part of our Annual Conference's delegation to the worldwide General Conference. If you happened to miss the service, or if you would like to see them in print, here is a recap:

Pastor Beth Wilterdink: I pray that you will talk to them or myself if you have any questions about the report or what work we did. The annual Conference began on Wed., June 7 with all of the clergy gathering for a session devoted to clergy matters -- both bringing on new clergy and releasing clergy who are no longer serving. We also spent the afternoon doing training around healthy boundaries and clergy ethics in the life of the church.

Ted Diadiun: We all know that the United Methodist Church has not been so united lately, and the East Ohio Conference has not been immune to the disaffiliation conversations that have been taking place both here and across the country. Here are the numbers:

The president of the Conference Board of Trustees announced on Thurs., June 8, that over the past year, 237 churches in the East Ohio Conference have voted to disaffiliate from our denomination. That's in addition to the 11 churches that had disaffiliated last year, and the nine churches in the conference that have closed in the past year. Twenty-two additional churches had begun the disaffiliation process but members voted to stay in our denomination.

Most of the churches that departed are small. Only 12 of the disaffiliations were from the larger churches, meaning those with an average worship attendance of 100 or more – leaving *the other* 37 of our larger churches intact.

I have been a delegate to a lot of Annual Conferences, and this was the only year I would call depressing. It's always hard to see friends and fellow worshipers decide to leave our side. But the good news is that 414 churches remain in the conference. We know that all 414 want to stay, so we are once again "United" Methodists.

The conference also is establishing a system of Lighthouse churches and Oasis groups that will welcome people who want to remain United Methodist but whose churches have disaffiliated.

Denny Nelson: This year the conference voted to reduce the size of the 2024 Conference budget of \$9,428,531, which is a reduction of 3.5% over 2023. This is due in part to cost-saving measures such as reducing the number of districts to four. We won't need as many offices and parsonages for district superintendents as a result. This reduction is added to the 5% reductions year over year, the past few years, to help bring down the cost of Annual Conference apportionments.

Cindy Myers: A recommendation from a Redistricting Task Force was approved, which reduced the number of districts in the East Ohio Conference from ten to four. The last time a re-districting was accomplished was in 2005, which reduced the number of districts from 12 to 10. It will be up to the Bishop and Cabinet to determine the boundary lines for the four new districts, as well as to come up with different models of the superintendency.

This committee was tasked with reducing the number of districts to meet missional needs and opportunities in order that new church co-operative parishes may be formed. This will put the East Ohio Conference in a better position for greater mission and greater purpose, as well as flexibility to structure things in new ways to enable the church to better focus on making disciples of Jesus Christ.

Sarah Dixon: Resolutions are matters for consideration by the annual conference which are not motions for action or proper amendments to reports by conference agencies, but which call for expression of opinion by the annual conference on issues of concern to the membership of the church and the general public. Resolutions may be submitted by any member of a United Methodist Church or an annual conference organization of the East Ohio conference.

This year we had four resolutions to consider and we voted to approve three of those four. The three we approved were: "Advocating for the Human Rights of Palestinian Children and Families Living Under Israeli Military Occupation," "Supporting the Christmas Covenant," and "East Ohio United Methodists Against Hate Crimes."
