## **Embracing Holy Week with Critical Thought**

I recently was honored to learn one of our members just completed reading the New Interpreter's Bible, which includes the NIV and NRSV translations of the Bible, as well as commentary and application. This journey has taken this individual 16 years, but it has allowed her to reach a personal goal and grow spiritually as she has studied the Bible.

As we continue our lifelong journey of faith, I encourage our community of faith to study the scripture and root ourselves in both devotional and critical reading of the scripture. And, especially, to know the four gospels, Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, as they allow us to know Christ. It is essential to immerse ourselves in the stories of Jesus, as they serve as both our guide and inspiration in following Him. The gospels offer a clear picture of Jesus' life, teachings, and the path He calls us to walk.

This year, as a congregation, we will focus on reading the Gospel of Mark, which many scholars believe was the oldest gospel written, and by doing so, we'll complete our exploration of all four gospels.

Understanding the life and mission of Jesus through these texts helps us grow as His followers, shaping the way we live and love in His name.

At the beginning of Lent, we will provide a reading plan so that, together as a community of Christ, we can read the gospel as one, reflecting on its message and applying it to our lives. Engaging with these scriptures deepens our relationship with Christ and strengthens our commitment to live according to His example.

Then, in worship and our Growth Groups, we will move through Lent differently than usual. We will start with Palm Sunday and journey through each day of Holy Week; we invite you to reflect deeply on the story of Jesus' final days. This year, several Growth Groups will explore the book The Last Week by Marcus Borg and John Dominic Crossan—a thought-provoking examination of the events leading up to the crucifixion and a study of Mark's gospel.

Borg and Crossan present a compelling narrative of the last week of Jesus' life, blending historical context with theological insight. They challenge and invite us to consider alternative perspectives on familiar stories, which help us reflect on the spiritual significance of these events and the backdrop of the religious and political leaders in Jesus' time.

As a community, we recognize that critical thinking is vital to our faith journey. We do not have to agree with every perspective we encounter. However, a different perspective may open the gospel for someone to receive Christ, who has rejected Christ or the gospel message in the past.

The Last Week offers a chance to engage with new ideas and ask deeper questions about the life and death of Jesus, which can help us see Jesus' impact in our lives. Let this season of Lent be a time for open dialogue and personal growth as we walk with Christ through the challenges of Holy Week and the sacred text of the gospel of Mark.

May this journey strengthen our faith and deepen our understanding.

We welcome Pastor Becky and her daughter Olivia. Please pray for them as Pastor Becky prepares to begin her ministry here and join our mission to "offer Christ."




**To our congregation:** After many years of discussion, disagreements and votes, our denomination decided at last year's General Conference of the United Methodist Church to amend our Book of Discipline by ending the ban on openly gay and lesbian clergy, and allowing celebrations of same sex marriages to be performed in our churches.

As Bishop Tracy S. Malone announced in June of 2024 at the East Ohio Annual Conference, that does not mean individual churches are required to celebrate and perform such marriages. Each church, and each pastor, can make those decisions for themselves. Like many of you, the individual members of our Executive Committee, upon whose shoulders these decisions fall, have disparate views of these changes. After much prayerful consideration over the intervening months, the Executive Committee in collaboration with Rev. Beth Wilterdink has decided that such requests will be received in the same spirit and with the same questions and interviews that have met traditional marriage requests over the last many years.

As we write this, there have been no requests for a same-sex marriage to be performed at Mayfield UMC. But we believe that we should make our position clear to the congregation before any individual requests are made.

We hope you will receive this decision with the same loving and caring spirit that we have all come to expect at Mayfield United Methodist Church. And as always, anyone who has questions or comments regarding this or anything else is encouraged to discuss them with Pastor Beth, or any member of the Executive Committee.

As I write this, I first want you to hear that something changed last year, but not everything changed. Who we are did not change, whose we are did not change, and our call as Christ's body did not change. Think about our mission to offer Christ, as an inclusive community of faith that worships God, cares for people, equips disciples, and works to transform the world. This is who we are, and this is what we are about. Which leaves me with a note, that as your pastor, and a pastor of Jesus Christ, I need to

share. Last year, the United Methodist Church removed language in the Book of Discipline around the LGBTQ+ community. This language caused pain to people's hearts and damage to their spirits, as they questioned who they were as a beloved child of God. As I write this, I know that we are not all of one mind on this decision of our larger denomination. However, I pray that our congregation is of one heart in our mission and vision which includes drawing people together toward Christ's radical love and God's grace.

I have lived in the world and the church long enough to hear many different viewpoints and many different arguments around the Biblical basis for what we believe on many different issues. I have heard hurtful and damaging arguments that one side or the other doesn't follow the scriptures closely enough. I'm tired of the fighting against one another, and pray that we will fight for one another. I pray we will join in Christ's work, as I shared in our vision for the future. *May we unite around the essentials of our Christian faith* and UMC doctrine, not allowing the non-essential doctrines or theology to divide us.

The world needs our witness of a loving, grace-filled community, that is for people to have healthy relationships with one another, even when we disagree. The world needs our witness that our families are different for many reasons, and yet, we can love one another in our differences.

I've tried to stay away from this conversation, not because I don't think it is important, but because it has divided us for too long. Let us come together, around one another, loving one another, supporting and standing with our LGBTQ+ brothers, sisters, children, friends, and family, letting them know that Christ invites them to the communion table with us. Christ invites them into small groups and work missions with us. Christ invites them into loving marriages with *God at the center of their lives*. May we recognize each person is a beloved child of God, loved and cared for, able to serve the church however they have been gifted and called by God. May we recognize that we are all children of God, loved and cared for, regardless of sexual orientation. May we recognize each of us is a child of God, and can be a part of a loving marriage in a loving and welcoming church community.

Our work as Jesus' followers is to invite, to work and live alongside people in order to better love them and grow in our likeness of Christ together. Our judgements can be left to God, and God's love can flow out to each other as we encounter that we are all invited, called, and included in the full participation of the life of the church.






